



PATTINSON'S HOME --- 1854 - DEOKLISHED Week APR

This two story frame home that still stands to-day 1969; at 176 Stanton ; was built by grandfather of Mrs. Pattinson . It stands on a bed of oak logs many still bearing their original bark. The interior of Mr. RaineY'S home is much the same as when he built it. The library however, that stood on the north side, was burnt during the Fennian Raids. It was rebuilt and is now the dining rooms. Mr. Pattinson added the 1 kitchen to the back in later years.

On the ground floor entering the front door is front parlor; and to the left of this a narrow stair ledding to the second floor. Behind the formal parlor is the large living room with all others leading ng from it. In the back wall of this room is the central fireplace. To the left of this is a narrow hall leading to the kitchen at the back. To the left of the hall is a small room that was once the den. on the noth side of the living room through an open doorway you enter the large dining room whichm in y ears pone by had been a library and kitchen ; befor the Fennians set fire to the house. Between the dining room and the fireplace there is another small room. Several small rooms lead off from the hall and are now used for bathroom and laundry. From the small kitchen rises a narrow back stairway which no doubt got most of the traffic. On reaching the top of the stairs you are in a large central room that could have ben used for a work area , sewing etc, and also extra sleeping room . From it you reach to other average sized bedrooms the one at the front of the house having a sall exstention that could have been used for storing trunks or for added sleeping quarters. A large bern stood at the back of the property but this was taken down some years back.

At the time Mr. Rainey put up this home there was only two other houses in the distict ; the brick home of Baxter on Batery (originally the Stanton home and that on the corner of Bertie and Stanton owned by J.A. CLARK In 1854 Mr. James Stanton deaded the land on the west side of the St. to Mr. Rainey for 50 pounds.

Sealed with my seal, and dated the fifteenth _____ day of deene _____ in the year of our Lord One thousand light hundred and fifty four WHEREAS the aforesaid Thomas Rainer has contracted and agreed for the purchase of Village tot number One on the West side of Stanton Street in the Village of Forthic "as laid down on a Plan of a part of said Village and being part of Lot number Three in the font or first Consistion of the Township of Bertie aforesaid ______ for the Sum of Frifty Pounds ______ to be paid as follows, that is to say in four equal annual instalments with interest thereon as the same becomes due in each and wing year from the date hereof, the first instatment of Twelve Younds ton shillings being paid in hand. NOW THE CONDITION of this obligation is such, That if the above bounden Ames fronton his heirs. executors or administrators, do and shall, after the payment of the said Sum of Hifty Counds _____ in manner and at the time aforesaid, at the request and cost of the said Thom as Rainey ______ his heirs or assigns, on or before the fifteenth day of _______ in the year of our Lord 18:507 ______ convey and assure, or cause to be well and sufficiently conveyed and assured convey and assure, or cause to be well and sufficiently conveyed and assured, unto the said Thomas Painer his heirs and assigns, or to such other person or persons, and his or their heirs and assigns, as the said Thomas Rainey shall nominate and appoint, and to such uses as he shall direct, all the said above described Lands and Tenements, with the hereditaments and appurtenances thereunto belonging, by such conveyances and assurances in the law as by the said Momas Mainey. his heirs and assigns, or his or their counsel, learned in the law, shall be reasonably advised and required, freed and discharged from all encumbrances whatsoever, AND ALSO, if the said Cames Stanton his heirs, executors and administrators, or either of them, do and shall, from the date of this obligation until such conveyance and assurance be made and executed, as aforesaid, permit and suffer the said Momas Mainly his heirs and assigns, peaceably and quietly to have, receive, and take to his or their own proper use and uses, the rents, issues, and profits of all and singular the said premises, and of every part and parcel thereof, without let, suit, trouble, disturbance, hindrance, or denial of the said Cames Tanton his heirs, executors, and administrators, or any of them, or any other person or persons whatsoever, by his or their, or any of their means, right, title, or procurement : then this obligation to be void, otherwise to be and remain in full force and virtue.
