Her family.

Married John Waddell; lived at Fort Stanley.

Their children for whom we ^{have} names only. Not even middle initials.

Frank--Catherine-- James-- John -- Amelia -- Ted.

Amelia married Joseph Bestwick, brother of Elias Bestwick, who married Thomas (18) See Page 6

According to my records, Amelia had 6 children.

Henry -- Amelia -- Joseph -- Mildred --

Fanny -- Kate -- Bertha -- Temple Stanley.

I knew Mildred and Bertha for they lived in Buffalo for a number of years.

The records also show two of these children, Mildred and Fanny also married;-

Mildred to Joseph R. Bradfield.

Fanny to Eugene Randall.

On Page 3 you will note John B. Warren, son of John Warren (5) - married a Mary C. Kerby. There is nothing in our records to indicate if this Mary Kerby is a descendant of Col. Kerby. She could be a younger sister to my Maternal Grandmother. See Page (9). Mary's dates are 1814 - - 1884.

Benjamin Harrison born Barwick, Maine 1758, died in and was buried in Ft. Erie 1835.

Benjamin married Jane Warren(?) , see page 1 and 5, daughter of Col. John Warren (1) on page 1. They had 8 children of whom, one, David Harrison was my Grandfather. David born [?], died, 1864.

David Harrison married Jane Kerby, 1810 - - 1835, daughter of Hon. James Kerby.

1785 - - 1854 and Jane Lambert 1785 - - ~~1859~~ 1839. They had four children;

Benjamin -- ~~Frank~~ ^{John} -- Jane -- and Alice Agnes. See Page 6 for record of Alice Agnes.

Alice Agnes married Trembridge Josiah Warren (26). See Page 5 and 8.

Col. Kerby fought in the War of 1812. On his monument in Ft. Erie it says;

"He was a faithful subject of the Crown and for his gallantry in 1812 received the thanks of his Country, and was presented with a valuable sword by the Legislature of Upper Canada."

I have heard this sword talked about but do not have the faintest idea ^{of} the heir.

If my source on Page 8 is correct about Mary C. Kerby, then Col. Kerby is related to both the Warrens and the Harrisons. He was my maternal Great Grandfather, since his daughter Jane married David Harrison, my Grandfather;-- and daughter Mary married a John B. Warren, son of John Warren. See Page 5.

Benjamin Harrison served as a private in Col. Phineas's Regiment of Mass chevau de
troops. (See Mass. Soldiers and Sailors in the Revolution--Vol. 7 Page 289.

He was taken prisoner in Canada, held there until the close of the war, and located in Ft. Erie 1797. Dillit and lived in the Queens Hotel in Ft. Erie. In the war of 1812 he was suspected of siding with the Americans, was arrested and later was forced to join the militia and take sides with Britain.
